Information

- You DO NOT have to be a gourmet chef or creative design genius, it's easy and fun!
- It's free to join in but you MUST register (see last page).
- Open to students and staff.
- Only 1 display per book title allowed so, first in best dressed.
- Can be done individually or in groups of up to 4 people.
- Either fiction or non-fiction books in the iCentre can be used.
- Please note iCentre does not have access to fridge or oven for storage or cooking on the day. We do have a microwave and a sink. Please consider this when you are thinking about your food display.
- If there is something extra special or interesting about your display (eg gluten free, contains nuts, you got this recipe from your grandmother or the book has special meaning for you etc) add it to the 'additional information' on the registration form.
- If you need recipe ideas have a look at call number 641 in the non-fiction section.

Instructions

- Borrow a book from the iCentre that you can match to a food or drink. (The book must be from the iCentre).
- Return registration form to iCentre.
- Make your edible display for Friday 21 June (keep it simple, just food arranged on a plate is fine).
- Food displays and accompanying books should be delivered to iCentre on the morning of the event, Friday 21 June when you get to school.
- Please return to iCentre at the beginning of first break to share all of the edible book food displays for lunch.

Matching food and book ideas

These are ideas to get you started. Use them to think about books you have read or brainstorm your literary food displays.

(you can use these books if you want to)

- **The Very Hungry Caterpillar by Eric Carle: Fruit platter (matching the fruits to what the caterpillar ate)**
- **Lion by Saroo Brierley: Butter chicken and rice (It's a popular dish from India, where this story began)**
- **A rose for the ANZAC Boys by Jackie French: ANZAC cookies (These cookies were popular with the soldiers during the war)**
- **Frogkisser by Garth Nix: Green cupcakes decorated with frogs (a prince is turned into a frog)**
- **Paris Dreaming by Anita Heiss: Croissants (It's French food)**
- **Alice in Wonderland by Lewis Carroll: Fairy bread (Alice went to a party)**
- **Memoirs of a Geisha by Arthur Golden: Tea (geishas perform tea ceremonies)**
- **Eat Pray Love by Elizabeth Gilbert: Pizza (Travels in Italy and descriptions of Italian food)**
- **Eragon by Christopher Paolini: Cake with blue icing in the shape of a dragon (Saphira is Eragon's blue dragon)**
- **Just as long as we're together by Judy Blume: Cupcakes (because it matches the picture on the cover)**
- **The Happiest Refugee by Anh Do: Rice paper rolls (Popular Vietnamese food and where Anh Do is from)**
- **Butter by Erin Jade Lange: Bowl of yellow jelly (the cover is all yellow)**
- **Just a dog by Michael Gerard Bauer: Cookies in the shape of a dog bone (Mr Mosely is Corey's dog)**
- **Pride and Prejudice by Jane Austen: Sandwiches, possibly cucumber with no crust (Food for a classic high-tea)**
